Key Verse

No longer as a slave, but more than a slave—as a dearly loved brother.

Philemon 1:16 (HCSB)

Brief Overview of Paul's letters from prison:

- Philippians Living with purpose and power in difficult circumstances.
- Ephesians Restoring a relationship with God through Christ and demonstrating that restoration in relationships with others.

Colossians – Knowing Christ as God and experiencing the new life made possible through a personal relationship with Him.

Philemon - Practicing forgiveness in Christian relationships.

Background

- Written approximately 61-62 AD during Paul's first Roman imprisonment.
- Slavery in the 1st century Roman Empire was central to both economic and political stability. Runaway slaves dealt with severely to lessen potential rebellion.

3 main characters of the book

Philemon – a leader of the church in Colossae, owned slaves, converted under Paul's preaching in Ephesus.

Onesimus – a slave owned by Philemon, ran away from Philemon (probably stole money and/or goods), converted under Paul's preaching in Rome.

Paul – Imprisoned for the gospel, father in the faith to both Philemon and Onesimus, central character in 1st century church used by God to establish doctrine and church practice

 urpose – Paul is sending Tychicus with letters to the church

at Ephesus (Ephesians 6:21) and Colossae (Colossians 4:7) and Onesimus (Colossians 4:9) with this letter to Philemon. The central purpose is to convince the offended slave owner that Onesimus is a brother in Christ now and should not be treated as a runaway slave. Onesimus was wrong and needed to make things right.

- · Paul was released from this imprisonment around AD 63-64 and continued mission work.
- · He was imprisoned a second time during the Neronian persecution around AD 66.
- He wrote 2 Timothy from this imprisonment.
